Letter

from our Pastor

Dear Partners on the Trail,

What is the future of the church? There is a lot of buzz about that very subject out there. This ought not surprise anybody because the Christian Church in America has been on a steady decline for the past twenty years. It is clear that culturally, Sunday mornings are no longer understood as worship/church time. Sports, quality family time, and home care now fill the Sunday schedules of families and seniors alike.

The rite of worship no longer engages participants in deepening or broadening of their personal lives, or their spiritual lives. A growing concern in congregations large and small is the growing disconnection with the people there. Once, the church was a center for social gatherings as well as worship. Once church softball leagues, bowling leagues, youth groups, potluck suppers, and ministry/activities engaged people and gave them additional connections to truly be the Body of Christ. That is not the world in which we live today.

Starkly put: what the church has been doing for the past 50 years is no longer working. In this 500th Anniversary of the Reformation it could be that we are on the verge of a "second reformation" for the Church to step into the next 10-20 years? I cannot even say 500 years.

Across the country, congregations are discovering some troubling issues. Among those who worship regularly, 3-4 Sundays each month, there does exist a reticence to talk about matters of faith. While participation in a familiar worship venue is comforting, an expected deepening of faith (discipleship) is not a "given."

Among those who worship less often, 1-2 Sundays each month, the lack of relationships and connections among members is noted as a reason for less participation.

Sunday School participation is "the canary in the coal mine." If parents do not treasure faith development for themselves, they will likely not treasure it for their children. It can no longer be assumed that Confirmation students will know even the most basic Bible stories. By Middle School, many students look at "faith development" as a foreign language.

Do not lose heart! Congregations are taking some big, faithful steps to address this chapter of the Church's life. Many congregations have added a Saturday evening service while limiting Sunday worship to one shortened service (40-45 minutes) plus the addition of "Connect Groups" small groups that use a study guide based on the readings from worship. Connect Groups not only address relationships, they also help participants to "speak words of faith."

In the Midwest and Northwest, ELCA congregations have opened craft breweries and coffee shops, offering Hymns & Brews to create a family friendly, neighborhood community. Here in Tucson, "Open Space" is an ELCA sponsored ministry that focuses on the gift of the arts, specifically "graffiti art." Pastor Lars Hammar is leading that edge-ministry in central Tucson. Open Space meets in a store front on Speedway.

The Reformation was not intended for the Church to teach the Gospel to keep it inside our walls. No, the Reformation was intended for the Kingdom of God to grow expansively within the hearts and minds of congregation members. You are the benefactors of the Gospel message. You are to be the ambassadors of that grace and mercy to others.

Nura wakes up most nights crying in her sleep.

Maybe she is haunted by the memories of 20 years in a refugee camp – not knowing when reprieve would come. Maybe her spirit forgets that her abusive exhusband is on the other side of the world – no longer able to beat and threaten her. Maybe she feels the weight of being a single mom of three children in a new country – having never had the chance to earn a living before.

But during the day – Nura is a different woman.

She works stocking shelves at a local store and learns the independence that comes with a hard earned paycheck. She makes friends with her co-workers. She studies English so that she can pursue her GED and advance her job opportunities. She focuses on her wellness with nutritious meals and exercise, with goals of improving her chronic illnesses that were never treated in the camp.

Nura is just one of hundreds of refugees that arrived in Arizona in 2016 because of your support. With simple tools like nutrition classes, English classes, and a routine medical appointment – Nura has began to blossom. Nura's next goal is to study for her driver's permit, so that she has more reliable transportation to work.

There are many refugees like Nura that are already in Arizona and need your support so that they can continue to access our services during a delay in resettlement funding. Your gift on Arizona Gives Day makes this work possible. Thank you.

We have been introducing **Setting 8** from the **Evangelical Lutheran Worship** hymnals since May.

Beginning September 17th, we will use *Setting 4* from the **ELW**. It should be familiar to everyone as the 2nd Setting of the green hymnal, the **LBW**. We will use that setting, as well as **Now the Feast and Celebration** through the months of Fall.

In <u>Advent</u>, we will introduce *Setting 3*, familiar to some. In <u>Epiphany</u> we will go back to **Setting 8**, until the season of **Lent** when we will introduce yet another setting.

Remember, you can sign-on to www.youtube.com and enter ELW Setting _ to hear all of these various settings.

The ELW has **ten settings** of the Holy Communion. It has been designed to allow congregations to be flexible with the various pieces and parts of the liturgy. The intent is to prevent congregations from settling into a "worship rut" by worshipping the form instead of the presence of God. Let our worship lift up the name of Jesus, and the presence of God in the Holy Spirit.

<u>Interfaith Community Services</u> celebrated their 100th Faith Community Partner at a gathering at St. Andrew's Presbyterian Church on July 25th. Over the past 32 years, ICS has grown in its base-of-support from congregations across greater Tucson. Now 100 worshipping communities, ranging the full spectrum of faith expressions, offer concrete



support for those at most risk: rent & utilities assistance, food, job resources and help creating resumes, and interviewing skills. Volunteers continue to be the heart-beat of ICS. Volunteer training is offered here at New Spirit bi-monthly. A new program "Homelessness Prevention Program" works with homeless families to get them off the streets and into affordable housing, paying for rent and utilities for 3-months so adults can focus on schooling, training, or securing a job.

New Spirit was recognized and thanked for our opening K-Hall to house the ICS East Office and providing key support for the Food Bank ministry, and offering several volunteers who help in a number of categories in ICS's ministries.



August Adventure

The Spiritual Practice for the month of August is: **Showing Mercy, Patience and For-giveness.** One of the quotes that I remember from my high school Shakespeare class was the "Quality of Mercy" speech from The Merchant of Venice. For those who aren't Shakespeare fans, I will quote only the first part:



The quality of mercy is not strained, It droppeth like the gentle rain from heaven upon the place beneath: it is twice blest; it blesseth him that gives and him that takes; 'tis mightiest in the mightiest: it becomes the throned monarch better than his crown; ... But mercy is above this sceptered sway; it is enthroned in the hearts of kings, it is an attribute to God himself; and earthly power doth then show likest God's when mercy seasons justice. (I really love that quote!)

There is beauty in living from a merciful heart instead of the judgmental part of ourselves. Anne Lamott, comments in an interview, "It's the way to peace, the way to feeling safe and connected. It's all the things we long for."

Mercy is the action of grace. It is being aware of the miracle that we are forgiven, and the miracle that we can forgive even with the most impossible and hurtful people; and we find this in our tenderhearted relationship with God and the Shalom of God wanting us.

Could mercy be our hope in the political realm of today? A. R. Hochschild writes in her book, "Strangers in Their Own Land," about her experience with the Tea Party movement in Louisiana. She came to terms again and again that miracles happen with people listening to each other instead of judgment and arms crossed.

Anything but mercy and forgiveness just hurts us and keeps us clenched and defensive. Communion and community can soften our scared hearts if we will be still and listen.

Maybe the best thing that we can do as we begin to concentrate on this "practice" for the month is the action of mercy. Ann Lamott has said over and over that if **you take the action, then the insight follows.** We don't have to wait until we get all perfect, but just extend mercy. Jesus said, "be merciful as your Father is merciful." In that amazing flow of mercy, we can enter into the embodiment of mercy in this fractured land.



Would you like to seriously deepen and broaden your faith life at New Spirit?

The Diakonia study is a 2-year course for lay members of the church to deepen and broaden your faith and understanding of the life and mission of the Lutheran Christian Church. The course includes six 5-week courses the first year (New Testament overview, Early Church History, Lutheran Creed and Confessions, Visitation, the Daily Life of a Christian, and a module of topical minis-

try of the local congregations). The second year also offers six 5-week sessions (Old Testament overview, Lutheran Theology, Faith in the American context, Communicating the Gospel, Lutheran Worship, and Christian Ethics).

Classes will meet weekly for each of the six courses each year. Local groups will decide on their class day and times.

The tuition cost of the Diakonia Study is \$360/year, or \$720 for the two years.

Upon completion of the course there will be graduation and certification of your completion of the course.

There will be an informational meeting at Our Savior's Lutheran Church on Monday, August 7th, from 6:30-8:00 p.m.
