Dear Partners on the Journey,

"April Fools!" I remember playing the "April Fools" jokes on classmates and family members every April 1<sup>st</sup>. I'm not sure of its origin, but it provided an opportunity to get a laugh and poke some fun at others. There are days when it feels like April Fool's Day is every day.

This year, though, Easter falls on April 1<sup>st</sup>. Many people I have encountered over the years treat the Celebration of the Resurrection as nothing more than an April Fools' prank. Jesus was dead. Everyone who passed by the road to Calvary saw it. Jesus was crucified, killed, dead dead. At the end of the day, they took his body down from the cross and laid it in a stone tomb. That was it. Nobody comes back to life! Or, so they think.

I come to Easter every year with a much different view. I see Easter as the new start, the second chance we get from Almighty God. The symbols that surround the day, butterflies, flowers, white raiment, and yes, even eggs, all point toward the new life Jesus calls us toward.

We have become so culturally tied to the Julian calendar, measuring a year from January  $1^{st}$  – December  $31^{st}$ , that we give all the power of the call to new life then. We celebrate the ending of an old year and the hopeful approach to the new year. Resolutions are made and "good intentions" are set into motion for a new life in the new year. Well, you know how well those resolutions work. And you know it doesn't take much for us to fall back into our ruts and routines, and in the end little in our lives change.

But, and there's always a but, Easter is the celebration of new life. It is the celebration of God's promise that death has no power compared to the power of mercy and grace for the world. Easter is the natural day for people of faith and the community of congregations to reaffirm the ministry and mission that we have committed ourselves to.

During the Season of Lent, the Gospel readings focused on the covenants God had made with humankind. We began with the covenant to Noah and the saving of Noah's family from the flood. We visited the covenant made with Abram and Sarai where the promises of a future was too difficult for the elderly couple to understand. But, because they were faithful, saying "yes" to each new adventure God offered, the promise of descendants as numerous as the stars in the sky came true.

Each week in Lent we heard a Covenant Promise. When New Spirit was born, we organized our life as a Covenant Community. Based in our Mission Statement: Our Faith is in Jesus; our Hope is in Grace; our Strength is in Love, the Membership Covenant addressed our roles in this community. Everyone had some responsibility. Everyone would share in the mission. Everyone would seek to grow in faith. Our covenant promise is based in community, knowing and loving one another. Our covenant promise is to gather for worship and praise on a regular basis.

It is Easter! The celebration of new life, a continuation of the covenant promise God has made with all of humanity! Isn't this a good time to consider our life in the coming year? Isn't it time to shake off the dust and do the hard work of inviting folks to worship; and joining in lending a hand whether it is a physical chore like tending a garden or being a member of a team focused on one area of New Spirit's life.

It is Easter! The darkness of sadness, death and depression is lifted as the Son-rises to gift us with each new day. Celebrate that promise and join in the dance of all Creation! Jesus is risen! And we are witnesses of that amazing truth. May your days experience the freshness of new life!

Last month we had 3,000 pounds of gorgeous green peppers, summer squash, and cucumbers. We will see what the Food Bank will send us on April 7<sup>th</sup>.

The new storage shed is here! As the numbers of people we are serving steadily grows, we now have a place to hold the ever expanding items needed. THANK YOU TO ALL WHO CONTRIBUTED AND MADE THIS HAPPEN.

March brought us another 30 clients. We are now seeing more "marginal" clients (they have shelter but still struggle with having enough food to eat). We now offer haircuts, 1-day bus passes, access to housing, packaged food, protein drinks, hygiene products, first aid products, and a great home cooked meal. Many now share Wednesday dinners with us and a few join us on Sunday mornings for worship. Much needed hugs abound at each event. Please visit us on April 14<sup>th</sup> from 1-3 pm and see for yourself!

We had a visit from Ted Prezelski from Ward 2 Council Member Paul Cunningham's office. He listened to concerns from our clients and will assist in trying to work out some problems that our clients have living on the streets.
