Beloved of New Spirit,

Maybe it is the change in weather and seeing plants beginning to bud again, but I am filled with hope. Maybe it is getting ready to celebrate Easter, but I have excitement for the coming days.

Maybe it is how we have been doing ministry together lately that has strengthened that hope and excitement. 

"Should I go to church?"

That question weighed on me. I didn't really believe in church. And honestly, life was going pretty well without it.

For three Sundays in a row, I sat in the parking lot of New Spirit Lutheran Church, debating whether I had the courage to step inside. I had been to more churches than I could count, but for the past six years, I had been "unchurched." I was unraveling beliefs I could no longer hold onto, searching for anything that still felt true. I was like the woman in the Bible who had lost a coin, turning everything upside down to find it. But what if it wasn't there?

So how did I end up in that parking lot? It started with a simple desire to help others. I came across their Homeless Blessings ministry and thought, *This is something meaningful I could do. I wonder if they'd even welcome me there?*

I checked out their website and read the welcome statement. And for the first time in a long time, I felt *seen*. I felt *known*. It was as if they were speaking directly to me, embracing my doubts, my questions, my past. That was reassuring. After all, I'm not everyone's cup of tea!

That first Sunday inside was better than I expected. I was welcomed—genuinely, warmly—but never pressured. The service was both familiar and yet completely new. And when I walked out, I felt something I hadn't felt in years: *hunger*. A deep longing to know more.

Since then, I have changed. As I learn more about Lutheran theology, as I experience God's Grace in word and sacrament, as I re-read scripture with fresh eyes, I am *blown away* by how freeing, how life-giving, this Good News of Jesus really is. The weight I had been carrying—the hurt, the wariness, the fear of being forced into a mold—began to lift. I had wondered if God had abandoned us to figure things out on our own. But what I see now is this—God is always moving towards us, reaching out to love us all.

I am thankful for New Spirit. Being here has helped me *receive* God's love, not just intellectually, but deep in my soul. It has given me the courage to put that love into action and, perhaps most terrifying of all, to *hope again*.

I am not perfect. I don't have many answers. But I am learning—learning to trust in God's promises, learning the power of God's grace.

Thank you for letting me share a piece of my story. I can't wait to hear yours.

BUILDING YOUR FAITH

The ABC's of QCD's

What is a QCD you might be asking yourself? QCD stands for a **Qualified Charitable Distribution** which offer eligible older Americans a great way to easily give to a charitable organization such as New Spirit Lutheran Church.



As many of you know, once you reach age 73 you must take a Required Minimum Distribution (known as a RMD) from your IRA even if you don't need or want the funds. The amount of your RMD becomes taxable income to you. With a QCD, you can transfer funds directly from your IRA to New Spirit and it will count towards your RMD for the year.

Why might a QCD be better than a charitable deduction?

A QCD can be a better tax strategy than a charitable deduction in some cases because it doesn't increase your taxable income. Charitable deductions may reduce taxable income but only if you itemize deductions.

A QCD might make sense for you if perhaps you are wanting to make a larger gift but don't have the cash to do so. Rather than taking a distribution from your IRA, paying taxes on the money and then donating it, you can transfer it directly from your IRA and not pay taxes on the distribution.

If you are 70 1/2 but not taking RMD's, you can still make a qualified charitable distribution from your IRA to New Spirit.

The Fine Print

- The QCD must be a direct transfer from your IRA to New Spirit and/or another charity.
- Individuals can donate up to \$108,000 to one or more charities per year.
- QCDs can only be made for the current calendar year.
- QCDs must be made by the same deadline as a normal distribution, usually December 31.
- QCDs are reported on Line 4 of Form 1040 or Form 1040-SR.
- You must receive a written acknowledgement from the designated charity before filing your taxes. As always, please consult your financial advisor and/or tax accountant to determine if a QCD makes sense for you.



My experience attending book studies at New Spirit.

It's been over a year now and I have attended over half of the monthly discussion get-togethers, so let me tell you about my experience. Topics that we discussed included some that I hadn't really thought too much about and tended to turn away from addressing them. Slowly I started participating more in the discussions. As I did that, I also started seeing and paying more attention to people affected by the many aspects of poverty and homelessness as I traveled around Tucson. They stopped being "ghosts" in my mind, and my mind and heart thought back to the WWJD (What Would Jesus Do) movement and how each of our book study sessions end. At the end of each book study, the question is asked: What can YOU, or WE as a group (small as we may be), do NOW to make a positive impact in this world we live in today – in this part of Tucson, in our community, in our life.

So, I started asking myself: What CAN I do, and I now look for ways to recognize, show love and help others as our paths cross. Going to book studies at New Spirit is expanding my understanding of how my interactions with others represent God's love to be shared.

Who will feed the kids this weekend? NEW SPIRIT LUTHERAN CHURCH WILL!

Blessings in a Backpack (BIB) is a national program that partners with elementary schools through churches and other community organizations to provide weekend food to low-income children who qualify for the Federal Free and Reduced-Price Meal Program. Last year BIB provided 3,183,295 hunger-free weekends at 1118 locations in 44 states and Washington, DC. Just \$4.60 per weekend (\$175 total) feeds a child in the program for the 38 weekends of the school year. Each child receives a bag of nonperishable food that includes cereal, mac and cheese, rice, beans, canned meat, fruit cups, granola bars, etc., to take home. While children receive free school lunches during the week, they may not have enough to eat over the weekend. The supplemental food they receive through BIB may be the only food they have to get through the weekend.

In 2012 New Spirit made a commitment to sponsor this hunger outreach program on Tucson's east side. We served 40 children from two schools in the first year. The second year, with generous congregational donations and a \$1,000 grant from one Walmart store, we were able to increase our support to 100 children in three schools. For the 2024-2025 school year, we will be serving 363 children. Each week volunteers purchase food and pack bags and deliver them to the schools (often to be greeted by the children who receive them!). We try to supply enough food to modestly supplement the whole family each weekend (e.g., providing a box of mac and cheese vs. an individual portion). We now have 5 fruit trees on our campus to provide future fresh fruit in our snack packs.

The 363 children we currently serve are from five east side elementary schools: Steele at 700 S. Sarnoff Drive; Erickson at 6750 E. Stella Road; Henry at 650 N. Igo Way; Ford at 8001 E. Stella Road; and Soleng Tom at 10520 E. Camino Quince.

Being well nourished vs. hunger can have a profound impact on a child's academic performance, school attendance, behavior and health. This is the vision of Blessings in a Backpack and New Spirit – happy, healthy children who can focus on school performance, attend regularly, and demonstrate academic success because of having full bellies.

Help us alleviate hunger in our part of the world. We have volunteer positions available for grant research, food procurement, packing, and delivery. Join us for packing at New Spirit every Tuesday at 8AM to see how we do it!

HOMELESS BLESSINGS "BECAUSE WE CARE"



JOIN US THE 2ND SATURDAY OF EVERY MONTH OCTOBER THROUGH APRIL, 1PM TO 3PM MAY THRU SEPTEMBER 9AM TO 11AM

Led by the Holy Spirit and Jesus's call to feed the hungry, in 2014 New Spirit began our outreach to the homeless population at a local park in central Tucson. We soon discovered a need on Tucson's east side, where there are little services for those on the street as most shelters are located on the south and west areas of Tucson.

"In 2015, we expanded our ministry to include a monthly event on our campus serving between 25-30 homeless and financially challenged clients. We share hygiene products, tarps, backpacks, blankets, socks, underwear, hats, gloves, and hot homecooked meals on the New Spirit Campus. We partner with local care providers to offer housing, mental health support, and even liaison with the Office of the Police Examiner.

Church members are provided with bags of essential items to share out of their cars with people on the street.

Move forward to 2025. We now serve 50 to 70 clients at our Second Saturday events and have expanded to include haircuts, tests for HIV and Hepatitis C, Narcan for opioid overdoses, packaged food, tents, and sleeping bags.

Over the years this vital ministry has grown to impact/serve/care for over 2,000 people annually.
