STEWARDSHIP CAMPAIGN UPDATE

As of November 30, we have received 54 statements of intent for a total of \$164,608. The good news is that this is 4 more statements of intent than last year, and \$19,568 more in giving commitment. The not so good news is that we are \$15,432 below our goal of \$35,000 in increased giving.

As a church that serves those that are homeless and food insecure, we must continue to learn about the struggles of those that we serve as well as about the systems at play. WOMEN'S MINISTRY GROUP MINUTES FOR NOVEMBER 2023

Women's Ministry Group (WELCA Bible Study Group) met at 1:30 on November 8, 2023, at the church.

Our Bible Study was session three of Holy Places – Pilgrimage. Over the past two months, we have explored what it means for people of faith to "live and move and have our being" in embodied relationships to physical places. In September, we pondered the holiness of home. In October, we examined sanctuary as a place of holy presence and sacred refuge. In November, we concluded our study considering pilgrimage: the journeys we take to a holy place or for a holy purpose, and the promise that God meets us along the way.

We assembled Christmas cards to send to those that are homebound.

We will pass out envelopes for the Women of the ELCA yearly thank offering to the congregation on Sunday, November 12, 2023, and collect the offering on Sunday, November 19, 2023. Thank offerings show gratitude for God's blessings and give us an important and tangible way to express that gratitude. As child poverty grows, lawmakers must prioritize tax relief for low-income families. Take action today.

A bipartisan group of lawmakers in Washington, D.C. are pushing for an expansion of the Child Tax Credit (CTC), with hopes that it will be included in a wider tax package by the end of this year. An expanded version of the Child Tax Credit helped cut child poverty nearly in half over the course of the COVID-19 pandemic, but those gains have largely been lost since the expansion expired at the end of 2021.

Emerging statistics and stories of ministry unveil alarming <u>experiences</u>. New <u>data from the Department of Agriculture</u> suggests that 3.5 million families fell into food insecurity from 2021 to 2022 – raising the total to more than 44 million people nationwide. Congregations, Lutheran hunger leaders and food pantries from many synods tell of volunteer exhaustion, increased demand for services and an urgency to address rising child hunger in our communities. With inflation, food prices and childcare costs continuing to climb, tax relief for low- and middle-income families would go a long way in supporting those of us who are hungry and our ministries serving those of us in the greatest need.

As negotiations are underway, many lawmakers remain on the fence over core issues, such as: making the credit available to as many low-income families as possible, expanding eligibility to families where a grandparent might be the primary caregiver, and ensuring benefits are received by all qualifying children regardless of their parents' immigration status. Lawmakers in Congress need to hear that an expanded Child Tax Credit is an urgently needed priority – and that child poverty is a profound concern for people of faith.

Today, <u>tell your legislators</u> that families should be able to afford the costs of raising a child in the modern economy, and that your lawmaker should champion an expansion of the Child Tax Credit before the end of this year.
