Dear Partners on the Trail....

Are you ready? Have you fastened your seat belts and locked your tray-table in its upright and locked position? Every year, it seems like we need to hear those words from our pilot all over again. The essence of those words: comfort and assurance.

Does anyone feel a need for words of comfort and assurance after finishing 2017? I surely do. The state of our world and nation has grown caustic. Fear is spouted by politicians, while they pad the coffers of the ultra-wealthy and corporations. A spirit of scarcity has been implemented when questions are raised about caring for the most vulnerable people in our nation: children, immigrants, the elderly, the under-employed. "So sorry, there just isn't any money to provide for the Children's Health Insurance Program any longer. Sorry." CHIP will be defunded in March. Sorry, no money.

That is the reality of our experiment in democracy. More and more people will face need this year. So, what is the church's role in the world as it is, and how will New Spirit decide to help our members and east Tucson to better navigate these uncertain times?

I believe that is our mission. Our Faith is in Jesus. Jesus advocated for the little, the least and the last. He did that in the face of Pharisees and Sadducees, the wealthiest of Israel's citizens. We believe and teach that the Scripture calls us to practice care for the less fortunate. That is part of New Spirit's DNA. You do that ministry like few other congregations of faithful people. With the vision of Laurie Bernard, Cathy Cermak, Marty Mostaff, and Phil Pierce New Spirit is actively engaging people at the level of their need.

Our Hope is in Grace. Grace is the "big" Lutheran word, and it carries with it an expectation: we claim God's love for us, and because we do, we will love strangers and others just like God loves us. I see better understanding leading us into the unknown future with clearer faith, hope, and love.

"When a prayer becomes a sermon." Prayers are an essential and complicated commodity in the life of the church. They are intended to plead for people in need of healing, or domestic safety, or encouragement in a difficult time. Prayers can be words of praise for all that God has given in this life, and in this world. Prayers can be confessions, acknowledging our shortcomings and pleading for mercy. Prayers can be vehicles of thanksgiving. Prayers can meditate on God's presence and the depth of that holy reality.



But, prayers are not intended to be sermons. Those "sermons" are often spoken, instructing God to "move the people to do this or that", or "make them understand they need to give more, or volunteer more." In all reality, we don't instruct God in doing anything. But, it can be a very tempting opportunity to "let the people hear what the pray-er wants those people to hear." In those situations, the prayer leaves the realm of holy conversation, and becomes a monologue from a "bully pulpit" It may sound like this "…just like it says in the prayer book I've been reading" is not a petition for God to bless, it is a sermon to teach or instruct "those people to do what I think they should do." It happens. It is something that we can all learn from as well.

We already have time set aside in every worship service for the sermon, interpreting the Scripture for daily living. If you are asked to offer prayers at worship or group settings be wary of using those words to tell God how those other people need to live, believe, or act.



<u>Church Council Retreat</u> The Church Council will be going on Retreat at the retreat center in St. David, AZ. Our two-and-a-half day retreat will help us look at where New Spirit has come in the past year, and how we can best prepare for the future. We have a


Since the meeting Shelley Colwell has volunteered and been appointed by the Council as Secretary.
