### A Different Approach to Stewardship

You might notice that our Stewardship Appeal looks a little different this year. This is the first year of our church's participation in a program called Stewardship for All Seasons (SAS), under a generous scholarship from the Grand Canyon Synod. Lorrie Firth, Cathy Cermak and Pastor Hartman are participating in this program, which includes seven "cohort" meetings/trainings, individual conversations with our leader and valuable guidance.

### The Basic Outline

This is not a "stewardship in a box" program. This program focuses on a holistic, all-year, *integrated ministry emphasis*, and not a once a year drive. Our goal is not only to increase our congregation's gift income, but to also create joyful, generous and energetic stewards. Because New Spirit is a generous congregation with a heart for the world, our theme this year is "Creating a Culture of Compassion."

You will hear us identify actual dollars needed to do the ministry of New Spirit Lutheran Church, rather than percentages or other types of giving (not that volunteerism is not important). There will be letters, temple talks, newsletter articles, "statements of intent" vs. "pledges," updates and celebrations of success, and thank you's. On Sunday, November 19, we will bring our Statements of Intent for giving in 2024 to the altar. We are asking that everyone complete a Statement of Intent, regardless of their giving plan. The Stewardship Team will make follow-up calls to those who do not turn in a Statement of Intent.

### Focus on Abundance vs. Scarcity

In Martin Luther's explanation of the first article of the Apostles' Creed ("I believe in God, the Father Almighty, Maker of heaven and earth,") he declares, "I believe that God has made me and all creatures; that He has given me my body and soul, eyes, ears, and all my members, my reason and all my senses, and still takes care of them." This not only establishes God as part of the Triune Godhead, it also identifies a mindset of abundance vs. scarcity. God made <u>all</u> of us and takes care of <u>all of us, all of the time</u>. God is a magnanimous God who delights in giving us all that we need.

This change of mindset <u>changes everything</u>! We are free to be as generous as possible. The opportunities for ministry and loving God and our neighbors are exponential! What if we lived as we profess to believe, that Jesus is alive? What if we believed that we could do all things through Christ? What if we believed the world needs the freedom and healing of the Gospel? What if we believed that we truly could make a difference – that this hurting world needs us? How would these beliefs and passions be reflected in our giving to the ministry work of New Spirit?

New Spirit is a lean church that depends on lots of people participating. We are convinced that the ministry we are doing is guided by the Holy Spirit and critical to our community. The potential for doing even more ministry is huge. Potential becomes reality when people step forward and participate. Your gifts make a difference. Your participation matters. So please, do not dismiss this stewardship appeal with thoughts or excuses of: "I can't afford to give," or "someone else will pick up the slack," or "I can't (won't) make a commitment – I'll give when I can." Please prayerfully and whole-heartedly consider your giving this year. Take a step, even a small step to begin to give consistently or to increase your giving. In the Body of Christ, every part is important, and New Spirit needs YOU and your participation to the fullest of your ability. We have been charged with critical work – to spread the love and healing of Christ in tangible ways. The world needs us!

### Women's Ministry Group Minutes for October 2023

Women's Ministry Group (WELCA Bible Study Group) met at 1:30 on October 11, 2023, at the church.

Our Bible Study was session two of Holy Places - Sanctuary. Whether a place for worship and prayer or for safety and refuge, sanctuary is made holy by the presence of God. And because God is with us in the world, sanctuary can show up in surprising places. Through the story of the transfiguration, we discussed what leads people to build sanctuaries in places where we have encountered the holy, and what Jesus teaches us about being a sanctuary "on the move". Reflecting on the circumstances that drive people to seek refuge in new lands, we remember the example and teachings of Jesus that urge us to welcome the stranger as we would Jesus himself. We learned about the "living stones" of the Palestinian church, our biblical history of exile and estrangement, and how it shaped the ways God's people are called to become a living sanctuary for the sake of the world.

Discussion was held as to possibly having a welcome meeting for the new member women of New Spirit.

The yearly WELCA thank offering is scheduled for November 19th. We will be passing out envelopes during worship, Sunday, November 12th.

Some of our project money will again be sent to the ELCA to help fund shipping costs to provide quilts to the needy worldwide.

### Ask Your Members of Congress to Provide Robust Funding for International Humanitarian Programs

Our commitment to peace as Christians affirms our support for human rights, conflict resolution and human dignity through cooperative international humanitarian support. The ELCA social statement <u>For</u> <u>Peace in God's World</u> names tasks voiced in "our hope that international relations can be ordered in ways that contribute to a just, free, secure, and nonviolent world. Yet we pursue this hope within the constraints and brokenness of our complex world" (p. 13). This is why it is meaningful to advocate for programs that support these values and projects in the 2024 federal budget.

Currently in discussion is the State, Foreign Operations, and Related Programs (SFOPS) bill, which dictates the levels of funding for U.S. international humanitarian programs and work administered by USAID and U.S. Department of State in collaboration with international organizations such as the United Nations. The current version of the House international affairs budget would not only <u>drastically slash funding</u> for many of these crucial, lifesaving programs, but in some instances <u>eliminate them entirely</u>. Currently, the House bill lists multiple countries in conflict as ineligible for U.S. assistance, such as the <u>Central African Republic</u> (CAR). Since independence, CAR has experienced continuing episodes of violence, with most resulting harm being inflicted on the civilian population (more in a forthcoming <u>ELCA Advocacy Blog</u> post). U.S. contributions to the <u>U.N. regular budget and multiple assistance programs</u> would be cut entirely, as well as other peacebuilding and stabilization projects such as the <u>Atrocities Prevention program</u> which has had significant benefits in CAR through conflict resolution training and equipping remote communities with high-frequency radios among other aspects and locations.

The ELCA's social statement on peace reads: "The Church is a disturbing presence when it refuses to be silent and instead speaks the truth in times when people shout out 'Peace, peace,' when there is no peace." Our faithful advocacy can respond to cries for peace, even when we may not physically see or hear these cries from across the globe. It is imperative that we encourage our legislators to fully fund U.S. international humanitarian programs and global governing bodies, and to reject changes to the budget that would undermine projects providing aid and support to our international siblings most effected by conflict.

Ask members of Congress to fully support U.S. funding of international humanitarian programs in the 2024 international affairs budget that will provide aid to those crying out for peace.
