Dear Partners on the journey,

Five hundred years ago.... is hard to imagine in our instant Facebook, Instagram world. Five hundred years ago, without the benefits of Eyewitness News, telephones, telegraph, or express mail a movement began which would change the world.

It was a grassroots movement of ordinary people and village priests challenging the abuse of power by those who sat in the seats of power far separated from the realities of everyday life. From the halls of gold and marble, church leaders became less concerned for the ills of the world, and more concerned with creating a piece of heaven on earth, made of marble, gold, and Michelangelo frescoes.

It was hard to see Jesus of the Gospels to be insisting on such grand palaces. And that is what moved Martin Luther to take his stand. His was a stand for the faith, and against the lure of power and wealth. His was a stand for the just treatment of common-folk and against the oppressive treatment of the wealthy upon the poor. His was a stand for confident trust in the promises of God through Jesus Christ, experienced in grace and mercy, and against the insistence of Rome to obey papal encyclicals.

The Reformation movement arose across Europe as the church, not led by the Pope in Rome but by local priests and pastors, would change civic life into what we know today. The "products" of the Reformation include the public school system, hospitals and nursing homes, public libraries, representative government at a local level, the rights of free speech, to peacefully demonstrate, and the beginnings of democratization bringing the voting process to villages and towns.

The Reformation broadened the faith-based teachings of the Church. Martin Luther was a Biblical scholar, and his desire was for his parishioners to read and know God's word. That was a very low expectation of the Roman Church, preferring to give the "role and authority of God" to the Pope as the primary "teacher and preacher."

From the Reformation many expressions of Christianity took shape, each focusing various aspects of God's revelation in Scripture. For Luther, grace was the focal pivot, "....we have been saved by grace, through faith."

For John Calvin, the references to the "Book of Life" in the Revelation gave him the notion that our salvation is "pre-destined" since it has already been written in the Book of Life. Predestination is not the sole foundation of the movement that would become known to us as the Presbyterians.

For Ulrich Zwingli, the focal point was baptism as the individuals public proclamation of their inner faith. The Anabaptist movement became a popular and strong movement in Europe. Anabaptists held to the literal translation of Scripture, and stressed personal conversion experiences as "proof of the faith." Anabaptists would become Baptists, Church of God in Christ, and many evangelical expressions.

The odd thing is that Martin Luther loved the Roman Church. His encouragement was for the Church to hear his concerns and commit to renewal. His desire was never to be the founder of the Lutheran Church. He longed for unity in the Gospel, a desire that we continue to pray for.

It is this tradition that has led us to 2017, as a church concerned for justice for all people, compassion for the poor and infirmed, and a commitment to deepen our faith in worship, prayer and diligent study of the scripture which Luther referred to as "the Living Word of God."

What marks this observance is the relationship that has been built with the Roman Church over the past 60 years. Our two churches are working closely on reconciliation in matters of faith on which we have agreement. Pope Francis will be present in Germany on October 31st to exhibit the Vatican's commitment to acknowledge much of what Martin Luther stood for was, indeed, correct. While this is historic, no, we will not be joining the Roman Catholic Church, nor they becoming Lutheran.

On October 29th New Spirit will celebrate Reformation Sunday. On October 31st watch for worldwide rites of worship in remembrance of the 500th Anniversary of Martin Luther taking a stand for change.



ELCA National Youth Gathering "This Changes Everything" will be taking place in Houston, Texas, June 27- July 1. Our confirmation youth will be attending. Registrations are due now. We will be joining 40,000 ELCA youth and adults for five days of worship, learning, music, and service. Why Houston?



Now post-Harvey for three days 15,000 ELCA youth and adults will set out to build, clean up, paint, decorate, and share our spirit with the people of Houston.

The Youth will be holding two fundraisers to help alleviate the \$1000 cost per person.

In Memory....Ray Schafer died on his 86th birthday following a long journey with congestive heart failure. Ray's life was celebrated at New Spirit on September 30th. Ray served at New Spirit by volunteering in the Food Bank, and he built some of our faith-chests that we give at Baptisms. We celebrated his life with a Barbershop Quartet, and his favorite hymn, the Navy Hymn, "Eternal Father, Strong to Save." Remember Lis Schafer in your prayers.

I was born in Oxnard, California in 1958. I am the oldest of four children. I have one brother and two sisters.

My parents were members of a Lutheran church in East Lansing, MI, where my father ran the dairy farm at Michigan State University. Every Sunday morning our family put on their "Sunday best" and went to church and Sunday school. My parents were very active in the church and our family was close friends with the pastor and his family. My early childhood memories of Jesus were of him in a long flowing robe and sandals, sitting under a tree with children and animals in his lap and surrounded by a crowd. Christmas always involved an Advent wreath on the dining room table and taking turns reading from the Bible. My siblings and I received an allowance every month, and part of that money was required to be added to the collection plate at church.

In 1972, my parents moved our family to Tucson. It was difficult for me to adjust to this new environment. There was no grass and hardly any trees. It was hot and dry when we arrived in June. Thank goodness my parents bought a home in a neighborhood that had a communal pool, with an active swim team. Joining the swim team allowed me to make friends and stay cool. We joined Dove of Peace Lutheran Church and I was confirmed there. The youth group (Luther League) was run by a wonderful man named Pastor Greg Adolf. He was extremely dynamic and outgoing. His sermons and teachings kept me extremely intrigued in my faith during my teen's and 20's. However, when I experienced the death of a dear friend in 1986, I felt a great loss and didn't understand God's plan. I didn't pray much at that time in my life, which was a big mistake on my part. I struggled with my faith for the next 15+ years. I felt a spiritual connection to God, but didn't work hard enough on keeping a relationship with him. I attended several Lutheran churches in town, but didn't feel a connection with any of them.

I was married for 24 years and have a wonderful 23-year-old son named Zachary. He is the love of my life. He and I attended church together for several years during his childhood. About 15 years ago, I started saying the Lord's Prayer every morning when I would get in my car and get ready to head out for the day. Any internal stress I was handling at that time, I found it comforting and calming to say this prayer.

My father invited me to attended church with him when he was in town. We would meet for breakfast first and then come to New Spirit Lutheran Church. As I started coming regularly, certain members of the congregation would also welcome me and make me feel comfortable being there. I began to feel connected and wanted to join and become part of the New Spirit family. I feel close to many members of the congregation and hope to continue to make new friends. I became Vice President this year and will be stepping up to President in January. I have more faith and hopefulness in my life with God. I still struggle, but I don't feel alone. I look for goodness and kindness in others. I work hard on patience with others and with myself. But I always know that God is there for me.

There are so many forms of prayer. There are rows of books on the shelves; there are silent mystics and those who shout from the roof tops making demands of God. But in all this diversity, Mary Oliver's poem puts me at rest, especially when I become self-conscious of my words or feel that I am lacking in faith. We sometimes question if there IS a God who is really listening? How do we even approach this mystery when our minds are so finite and our longings so vast for ourselves and the world?

One important centering truth is that prayer is **not to change the mind of God, but for God to change us.** That requires a sense of simple dialogue; it requires moments of silence and listening.

As we practice prayer, the Spirit guides us to the experience that there is One who is hearing our simple prayer, one who cares for us deeply, one who knows us and is profoundly present. As we embrace stillness and slowly learn to remain in quietness, we can begin to sense that our intentions and our motivations change. We begin to line up with the one who is hearing our prayer as God holds our conversation in infinite love and mercy. Our prayer becomes edged into a bigger frame and understanding. We change. We become wiser, more compassionate and understanding.

Our prayer is a state of communion; it is a state of union and connection with Love. And that leads us to understanding the path of "praying constantly" as Jesus taught. This isn't prayer with elaborate words, but a conscious loving union with God demonstrated wherever we are in the world. It is a way of being in the world---our conversations, our labors, our interactions, even the most mundane aspects of life—an iris or a weed. In this state of consciousness, nothing is secular; all is holy ground in this very real union with God.

"Be still and know that I am God." God give us the grace and longing to be still and to open our prayer to every moment of life.
