Dear Partners in the Gospel,

In many corners of the world October is the beginning of Fall. Leaves begin turning colors, temperatures drop significantly, thoughts are turned toward being prepared for the long, long winter that will soon be upon us. That is the truth, unless you live in the Sonoran Desert.

For us, October means the end of 100 degree days, but the 90's will be our companion for some time to come.

It has been a year since we celebrated the 500th Anniversary of the Protestant Reformation. While that was a memorial marker, I have to say that the state of the church today is what will lead us into the future. I believe that Martin Luther would be impressed by some things the church is doing, and distressed to see things that the church is not doing.

Over the past couple of months, I have read a number of articles about the waning of the Christian church. Noted by the authors are a number of visible signs of the Church's decline.

Sunday morning worship attendance is down. True. Sundays have been declining for the past 30 years. Why? There are lots of little reasons. For families where both parents must work, Sundays have become "family time." Two income families have discretionary income that allows weekend adventures. Sports leagues have claimed Sunday mornings as another opportunity to have young ones practice. Those same leagues hold their players hostage by denying them playing time if they do not attend Sunday morning practice. It happens.

Financial support is declining in relationship to the decline in attendance. But, and there is always the exception, congregations which are deemed by their members to be "alive and dynamic" face fewer financial imbalances. Alive churches are engaged in ministries that give life to its members. Worship, learning, and fellowship are central to their life and faith. These congregations are infectious with joy and welcome. People care about one another. People understand how difficult it is for a first time visitor to step into an unfamiliar church, and those people are great ambassadors for offering welcome and connections. Where churches are understood to be alive and vibrant, support for the ministry becomes second-nature.

New Spirit is leaning into its ministry life. Guests tell us our welcome is warm and genuine, unlike experiences visiting other churches, but (yep, another one) our folks don't close the deal. Did you get their phone number, or e-mail address? Did you invite the guests to sit with you during the Fellowship time? Did you give the guests the latest newsletter, or introduce them to your out-going friends? How do you welcome guests and visitors?

Our outreach is a tangible example of our "life together." Blessings in a Backpack feeds 279 children every weekend during the school year! That is an incredible number for a congregation our size. And, it does not stop there. The homeless of the east-side of Tucson know New Spirit is a place of welcome and safety. Our welcome is the echo of Jesus' words of welcome to all who came to him. Why do we do this? We do it because Jesus would do it.

I want to encourage more of you to step into the flow of the Spirit's power at New Spirit. This program year, we will be offering you new and greater opportunities to be the Body of Christ in this place.

The word for this new year in church life will be *courage*. Have courage as we move toward 2019. Have good courage to deepen your faith in God's grace by helping where you can; and giving more because you can; and searching more for the person in your life who needs to hear the Good News of Jesus. That Good News gives us new life: it is founded in love, and it is manifest in welcome and forgiveness. Do not be afraid of what is to come! God is here, and God is calling us to life and new life.


experience, a place for them to connect with members like you.

We have a new Bishop!

On September 8th, the *Rev. Deborah Hutterer* was installed as the sixth Bishop of the Grand Canyon Synod. She is the first female Bishop for this Synod, and is one of seventeen female Bishops in the ELCA.

> Bishop Hutterer came to the Grand Canyon Synod when she was called to serve with Lutheran Social Services of the Southwest. While she began as the Congregational connector, she soon became the Director for Development. Under her leadership and diligent work she reconnected congregations with LSS-SW after nearly 12 years of disconnect. In her term, financial support for the ministries of LSS-SW has grown 450%!

She brings to the Office of the Bishop a different set of skills and aptitudes. While she served as a parish pastor for some years, her administrative gifts and organizational skills have worked well in each of her calls. She will call the congregations of the Grand Canyon Synod to re-consider their/our roles so they/we can better speak out about the Gospel of Jesus Christ. She will look more creatively at how we can communicate with our neighborhoods and communities.

Bishop Hutterer will also call the Synod to consider how we can better communicate and cooperate in our local ministries. How might we share the things we do well, and how might we rely upon other congregations to lift up the places where we fall short. Not every congregation can be a "full-service franchise." How might we better connect with local congregations? These will be the major questions we will be facing in this new program-ministry year.

The office of Bishop can be a struggle for one person. It can be a lonely position, too. Please put Bishop Deborah on your daily prayer list. Plea for her to be wise and courageous; compassionate and understanding; and clear in her discernment of what God has in store for the Grand Canyon Synod.

WELCA (Women of the Evangelic Lutheran Church in America) will have their convention in Phoenix in November. If you are interested in attending, speak with Joyce Dow.


