Dear Church,

I find myself torn with what to write in this month's newsletter. There is so much going on. There is a heaviness being felt by many, right now. There is also excitement and anticipation for many as we head into the end of the year. We have much to look forward to as we enter the final months of 2025.

From the

Sunday, October 26th will be when we commemorate the Reformation. That will certainly be a very busy weekend. Friday, there is a funeral for Lis. Saturday, we will once again host Trunk or Treat. Then Sunday we commemorate the Reformation. It is in part in the example of the Reformation that has given me hope lately. In the Reformation we see people that took a stand in the face of injustice and exploitation. The leaders of the Reformation also took advantage of the most current technology of the time.

When those original reformers started the movement, they were called Protestants. They were the protesters of the powers at that time. We will commemorate the Reformation while also asking ourselves are we truly living into the heritage of the Reformation. They were committed to proclaiming the liberating gospel of the grace found through Jesus. A grace that we cannot and do not earn, but that is freely given through God's love for us.

We are in that same "business" of the reformation. Maybe this is even more true today than it was 5 or 10 years ago. I look out my window, or look at the news, and see the same things you all see. I see a world crying out for meaning, for love, joy, peace, patience, kindness, goodness, faithfulness, gentleness, and self-control. The very things that Paul tells us are the fruits of the Spirit. The same Spirit that drove the reformers to do what they did. The same Spirit that is now with us in our time and in our context.

The Reformation was not a one-time historical event but is a movement that continues today. We must take bold stands like Luther, Melanchthon, Zwingli, and Knox took born out of their understanding of the freeing grace of Jesus. Like those great Reformers, we must also embrace the technology of the time. We must spread the message of God's love we have been entrusted with in all that we do. The Reformers knew they were up against a powerful opponent and that there was great risk. Yet, they continued. They continued to speak out. They continued to distribute their ideas far and wide. It's our turn now.

Look, I get it. I have asked a lot of you this year, and to be honest since I became your pastor. Each time you have risen to the challenge and surpassed the original objective. I pray that I am wrong in what I am about to say. Deep in my soul I feel that we are entering a time of great challenge. There are forces out there that are using Jesus and Christianity as a tool of empire, a tool to promote hate, a tool to exclude, a tool to justify things that go against the teachings to love God and love neighbor. These forces aim to convince people that the way of Jesus is not based out of love but is instead based in the very things Jesus was tempted with in the wilderness. This is the form of "Christianity" that is speaking the loudest right now. This is what has aligned itself with those in power. It will also be what at least American Christianity is known as, unless. Unless we start to use our voices more. Unless we start to distribute the message of love we have been given. Unless we stop being afraid to invite people to come and experience a place where God's love is made real. Unless we stop giving ourselves excuses not to talk to people. Unless we rise up like the reformers of old.

Martin Luther could not have done the Reformation all on his own. He certainly was the spark that started it that fateful day he posted the 95 Thesis, but he needed others to carry out the movement. He needed the printing press and those that knew how to operate it. He needed the folks that distributed his printed words. He needed Philip Melanchthon to write his words down so that they could be spread. He needed people and others to step up to help lead the movement. Eventually there were disagreements and some splits between the groups based on theological understands of things like the sacraments yet in the spirit of taking a stand to free people through the understanding that we are saved by grace the reformers were united. They each used the gifts they had been given to help spread the movement of the reformation.

Now it is our time. We need those that are going to share the message God has given us. We need people that are going to share our social media postings. We need people that will take our invitations out to their neighbors and those they cross paths with. We need people that are going to continue to financial support what the Spirit is doing here at New Spirit. We need people that are going to serve on the committees that make ministry happen. We need you to step into the long tradition of reformation.

In the liturgical rite of Affirmation of Baptism, each person wishing to affirm their baptism is asked "Do you renounce all the forces of evil, the devil, and all his empty promises". We can see some of those empty promises by looking at what temptations were put before Jesus in the wilderness. The Affirmation of Baptism continues with "Do you intend to continue in the covenant God made with you in Holy Baptism: to live among God's faithful people, to hear his Word and share in his supper, to proclaim the good news of God in Christ through word and deed, to serve all people, following the example of our Lord Jesus, and to strive for justice and peace in all the earth?" (Lutheran Book of Worship, aka LBW, aka the Green hymnal, p. 199-201).

It is time for each of us to live into the "I Do, and I ask God to help and guide me" response to those questions. We can no longer allow our voice to be drowned out. We can no longer rephrase the response to "I Do, and I ask God to help and guide others to do the work". Each of us has a role in this, regardless of age, stage in life, etc.

Let us each as individuals and as community boldly step into our reformation moment.

While 70% of Americans consider making a will important, only about 40% have actually followed through in creating one.

We witness every day what little control we have over the future. So, finally Ron and I met with an attorney a couple of years ago to create a living trust. Not only was it important that we took care of our children and grandchildren, but it was essential to us that we remembered New Spirit in our will. Matthew reminds us that, "where your treasure is, there your heart will be also" (Matthew 6:21). Our hearts have been with New Spirit for many years. We cherish our New Spirit family and the ministries that are so impactful to the community. We want to see New Spirit grow and thrive in bringing the Gospel to a hurting world.

ENDING AT THE BEGINNING.

As Presiding Bishop Elizabeth Eaton's time as Presiding Bishop comes to a close, we give thanks for her ministry. Officially, Presiding Bishop Eaton's time as Presiding Bishop ended September 30th and Presiding Bishop-Elect Yehiel Curry term begins October 4th. We look forward to Presiding Bishop-Elect Yehiel Curry's time as Presiding Bishop, he will be installed as Presiding Bishop on October 4th. For now, let us hear Presiding Bishop Elizabeth Eaton's final words to the church originally published in Living Lutheran.

"ENDING AT THE BEGINNING"

I started my ministry as presiding bishop with these four emphases: We are church. We are Lutheran. We are church together. We are church for the sake of the world. I will end as I began.

We are church. There is no other institution on earth whose reason for being is the proclamation of the gospel. "It is also taught that at all times there must be and remain one holy, Christian church. It is the assembly of all believers among whom the gospel is purely preached and the holy sacraments are administered according to the gospel" (Augsburg Confession, Article VII). That's it. The works we do in service to the world are important, but they are not the essence of the church. The <u>ELCA</u> does not exist in order to work for justice. Rather, because we are nourished by word and sacraments, the ELCA is free and empowered to do so.

The church is also marvelously intricate and interconnected. "We, who are many, are one body in Christ, and individually we are members one of another" (Romans 12:5). There is no such thing as a solitary Christian. God's love for us through Christ and poured into our hearts by the Spirit is for each of us. But each of us is just one member of the body of Christ. We understand the church in the same way.

"This church shall seek to function as people of God through congregations, synods, and the churchwide organization, all of which shall be interdependent. Each part, while fully the church, recognizes that it is not the whole church and therefore lives in an interdependent relationship with the others" (ELCA "Constitutions, Bylaws and Continuing Resolutions" 8.11.).

We are Lutheran. The average Lutheran in the <u>Lutheran World Federation</u> (LWF) is a woman in Tanzania. There are more Lutherans in Ethiopia, Indonesia and Madagascar than there are in the ELCA. The LWF has 150 member churches in 99 countries. What binds us together? Certainly not one culture or cuisine. Rather, it is the clear witness of the gospel that sets us free. "It is taught that we cannot obtain forgiveness of sin and righteousness before God through our merit, work, or satisfactions, but that we receive forgiveness of sin and become righteous before God out of grace for Christ's sake through faith ..." (Augsburg Confession, Article IV).

This is revolutionary. The standards of the world by which we are measured, or we measure others, are a figment. We don't claim perfection for the church. We're not there. But as Martin Luther said, "This life therefore is not righteousness but growth in righteousness, not health but healing, not being but becoming, not rest but exercise. We are not yet what we shall be, but we are growing toward it, the process is not yet finished, but it is going on, this is not the end, but it is the road. All does not yet gleam in glory, but all is being purified" ("Defense and Explanation of All the Articles"). We know there is law and gospel, that we are saint and sinner, that we are bound and free, and we entrust that all to God.

We are church together. Paul wrote that we do not live to ourselves. We live in a time when fear is used to separate us. This is the tool of every authoritarian regime. The church is different. The Spirit calls, gathers and keeps the whole church on earth. We belong to God, we belong to each other, and we belong to the world.

We are church for the sake of the world. We are not only freed from sin, we are freed for service to the neighbor. Here is where the essence of the church—the proclamation of the gospel—gives power and shape to the work we do in Jesus' name. We are church for the sake of the world not out of obligation or for reward but out of love.

So there it is, dear church, my farewell address. We each have this ministry for a season. My season as presiding bishop has ended. Bishop-elect Yehiel Curry's season is about to begin. Pray for him, his family and the churchwide staff.

But be assured that the season for the ELCA is not over. God hasn't finished with this church yet.



Being well nourished vs. hunger can have a profound impact on a child's academic performance, school attendance, behavior and health. This is the vision of Blessings in a Backpack and New Spirit – happy, healthy children who can focus on school performance, attend regularly, and demonstrate academic success because of having full bellies. New Spirit provides snack packs to those who might not have enough to eat on the weekend.

Our weekly packing for the new school year began on August 19th. New Spirit's collection of school supplies over the summer has been delivered to all 5 schools and 1 after-school program.

The 363 children we currently serve are from five east side elementary schools: Steele at 700 S. Sarnoff Drive; Erickson at 6750 E. Stella Road; Henry at 650 N. Igo Way; Ford at 8001 E. Stella Road; and Soleng Tom at 10520 E. Camino Quince.

HOMELESS BLESSINGS NEXT EVENT OCTOBER 11TH 1PM TO 3PM







We've been busy this summer. Sorting clothing, accepting donations, delivering supplies to San Juan Baptista for the Nogales, Mexico mission, helping several people with household supplies from our friends at Tanque Verde Lutheran Church, and feeding our neighbors are just a part of our outreach at New Spirit. One of our housed couples welcomed their daughter in September!

On the 2nd Saturday of each month, we share hygiene products, tarps, backpacks, blankets, socks, underwear, shade hats, umbrellas, cool cloths, clothing, shoes, and haircuts, along with hot home-cooked meals for 50 to 70 unhoused/financially insecure brothers and sisters. We partner with local care providers to work towards housing, mental health support, HIV/Hepatitis C testing, and even liaison with the Office of the Police Examiner.

Church members are provided with bags of essential items to share out of their cars with people on the street reaching another 100 unhoused neighbors per month.

We also volunteer with the City of Tucson Housing First MDOT Care Packet Assembly once a month for sharing at homeless camps.

As of August 1, 2025, we have emergency food boxes for families and singles. In the event that you are unable to obtain a food box from a Community Food Bank pantry, or and emergency bag from ICS located on our campus, please call the office at 296-2461 if you need help.

This vital ministry has grown to impact/serve/care for over 2,000 people annually. Want to volunteer and make a difference in someone's life? Contact Laurie Bernard at lbernard2008@hotmail.com with questions.
